Between July 2021 and July 2023, 121 individuals responded to a public survey related to access and inclusion within the City of Mesa. The following report provides data from this survey as well as a summary of findings.

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### Summary of Findings

The significant amount of data provided on the following pages can be summarized into five main topics that are listed below:

#### 1. Transportation:

- A. Bus stops need safety improvements and better accessibility.
- B. Ensure train stations and public places are easily accessible.
- C. Enhancing pedestrian safety with proper crosswalk signals and curb ramps.

#### 2. Housing:

- A. Address the shortage of affordable housing for elderly and low-income individuals.
- B. Develop housing solutions and support networks for those with undiagnosed or underserved disabilities.
- C. Create more affordable, integrated, and accessible housing.

#### 3. Employment:

- A. Partner with local schools and businesses to promote disability employment.
- B. Encourage businesses to actively support and employ people with disabilities.
- C. Potentially host job fairs and events to connect job seekers with employers.

#### 4. City Facilities and Communication:

- A. Provide more specific information about city access services and efforts in electronic or Braille formats.
- B. Establish a Disability Access/Inclusion Advisory Committee for representation and accurate information.
- C. Ensure public facilities are inclusive and accessible, with features such as automatic doors and family bathrooms.
- D. Create inclusive playgrounds and outdoor facilities to accommodate those with disabilities.

#### 5. Safety and Well-Being:

- A. Address safety concerns for those who are elderly and/or affected by disability, considering their vulnerability to crime and targeting.
- B. Develop resources and programs to support the homeless population, considering the unique needs of individuals with disabilities.
- C. Focus on inclusive city development, addressing both richer and poorer areas and ensuring all communities benefit.



The average of the responses, on a 5-point scale was 3.18. Overall, there was an equal number of votes for the responses, "Somewhat accessible, but still some major challenges" and "Generally accessible, but could be improved".

Thirty comments were also provided. A summary list of the additional comments include the following:

1. **Public Transportation Enhancement:** Improve bus services, especially on Baseline Road, and ensure crosswalks at bus stops on major roads for better access to businesses and services.

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- 2. **Sidewalk and Crosswalk Improvement:** Mark crosswalks more clearly and address the lack of cutouts and accessibility issues on sidewalks, ensuring safe passage for pedestrians.
- 3. **Accessible Doors:** Promote the installation of power/push-button/motion-sensitive doors in businesses, making entrances more accessible for disabled individuals.
- 4. **Seating and Shade:** Install seating and provide shade at bus stops, public areas, and parks, creating comfortable spaces for people to rest.
- 5. **Inclusive Playgrounds:** Build more inclusive playgrounds throughout the city to allow children of all abilities to play together.
- 6. **Housing Accessibility:** Address the spread-out nature of suburban housing and provide better access to necessary services, such as groceries, pharmacies, and medical facilities.
- 7. **Information Accessibility:** Improve communication about resources for people with disabilities, including parks and recreation classes, cooling centers, and public transportation options.
- 8. **Restroom and Facility Accessibility:** Install changing tables in restrooms at parks and city buildings and ensure accessibility features like ramps are available at government buildings.
- Light Rail Expansion and Automatic Doors: Expand the light rail system into residential areas
  and promote legislation requiring businesses to install automatic doors for better
  accessibility.
- 10. **Overall Inclusivity:** Foster a culture of inclusivity by addressing hostile design in public spaces, providing 24/7 access to government programs and buildings, and improving the affordability of public transit for all.

These priorities encompass a range of improvements to enhance the overall accessibility and quality of life for disabled individuals and the broader community in Mesa.



The average of the responses, on a 5-point scale was 3.36. The response that Mesa's policies and procedures are "Generally supportive, but could be improved" received the highest number, at 27.59%.

Sixteen comments were also provided. A summary of the additional comments includes the following, related to policies and procedures to support people with disabilities in Mesa:

1. Accessibility of Public Amenities: Ensuring that all communities in Mesa have accessible and convenient rest areas, bathrooms, air conditioning, and water within walking (or rolling) distance of every housing area. This priority aims to enhance the comfort and well-being of individuals with disabilities by providing necessary amenities in close proximity.



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
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- 2. **Reasonable Accommodation for Older Adults:** Addressing the issue of the City of Mesa disregarding reasonable accommodation requests for older adults in residential homes. This priority involves reviewing and revising policies to ensure that older adults have suitable housing options and aren't forced to move due to accessibility challenges.
- 3. **Employee Awareness and Training:** Increasing employee knowledge and awareness of disability laws and regulations. This priority emphasizes the importance of educating city employees about these laws to ensure proper implementation of policies that support people with disabilities.

Of the 104 people who indicated that improvement is needed from the list, the highest scores were "Programs and services" at 40%, "Parking near city facilities" at 37.27% and "Street and crosswalk signals" at 36.36%.

Thirty-seven people listed specific examples, locations or details where access is needed. Their comments are found in the Appendix, on page 24. The following is the summarized feedback that has been categorized into the topic areas provided:

#### 1. Amenities at City Facilities:

 All communities need accessible and comfortable amenities, including rest areas, bathrooms, air conditioning, and water.

#### 2. Bus Stops:

- Bus stops along Southern Ave. lack handicap accessibility.
- Bus stops need proper information for users.

#### 3. Parking near City Facilities:

 Accessible parking spaces, especially for disabled individuals, are insufficient and need improvement.

#### 4. Parks and Common Areas:

- Parks are inaccessible and lack inclusive features.
- Some playgrounds are not wheelchair accessible.

#### 5. Pedestrian Pathways:

- Sidewalks have uneven surfaces, impacting accessibility.
- Accessible pedestrian signals are needed at various intersections.

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#### 6. Printed Materials:



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### 6) What are the most effective means of communication?





Of the 103 who responded to this question, 75 (or 71.43%) indicated that this question was not applicable to them. 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### Appendix of Raw Data

#### Question 1

### In general, how would you rate the City of Mesa's accessibility?

- 1. Bad air quality and moldy smells at Red Mountain Branch Library.
- 2. Bus service on Baseline Road would be appreciated to access those businesses. Also, crosswalks for bus stops on the opposite side of major thoroughfares.
- 3. Crosswalks are not marked well at all, and traffic is coming from courts."
- 4. Disabled citizens have been relegated to the minority back seat while other more fringe and less populous groups garner more of Mesa's attention.
- 5. Doors are a huge problem. Few businesses have power/ push button/motion sensitive doors. Motion sensitive (no wiring for the actuator button) is around \$3,500.
- 6. Handicap walk from parking to the train station is often difficult and far to go. Have to cross the streets etc.
- 7. Have no idea. I never needed to 'access' anything related to the City of Mesa. How is it even possible that 'access' so something like a bike path would have "challenges"?
- 8. I am blind in one eye. I spend a lot of time looking for the cursor on the computer screen. It would help me if the cursor were darker on the screen.
- 9. I notice that many bus stops don't have any form of seating or shade/protection from the sun.
- 10. I use a scooter and often can't open the door because it's not an automatic operation.
- 11. I'm legally blind, have lived in downtown Mesa for nine years, and have had no problem getting around. That being said, I have found the removal of seating has greatly reduced the ability to walk distances, especially during summer months.
- 12. Many, many areas of sidewalk are not accessible-- for example--> Pima St. south of Southern to Heritage Park. The sidewalks have no cutouts, and it's just a steep drop-off curb to cross the street.
- 13. Mesa does a great job for specific disabled groups. I am 49 and disabled. I can't leave the house much due to physical health issues. I'm not intellectually disabled or elderly. I don't "fit" into most of the typical groups. The only actual services I can take advantage of are the library, books, great courses, etc. Adding more content or expanding with things like nature or travel programming is a nice outlet for people with disabilities who can't get out much.
- 14. More ramps at 222 E. Javalina Ave in front of the Superior Court building.
- 15. need a program to help with home repairs and home modifications.
- 16. Not all bike paths are lit, most bus stops are not shaded, and it is challenging to gain clarification on parks & rec classes. Parks & bike paths don't have enough drinking fountains and refillable water bottle stations. Communication on resources for homeless and cooling centers in the summertime is not widely advertised.
- 17. Not enough public transportation like bus stops.
- 18. People parking and blocking access to sidewalks and community mailboxes. I'm legally blind and have a guide dog. If my guide feels unsafe to proceed, he will not allow me to proceed.
- 19. People parking in handicapped spaces that are not handicapped.

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- 20. Playhouse handicapped seating on top.... The railing is at eye level, making it difficult to see. When seated in a wheelchair.
- 21. Red Mountain Multigenerational Center is too far from a bus stop. Other than driving or depending on someone else, Paratransit is probably the only other option.
- 22. Restrooms that have changing tables for kids or adults over 40 lbs. at the parks and city buildings would be fantastic. Nobody wants to be spread eagle on the floor of a dirty restroom in public. At least one accessible swing or option for wheelchair users per park would make them not have to look on when others are at play versus meeting with friends always at 1 or 2 Parks that aren't always close by.
- 23. Suburban housing in Mesa is too spread out, and many communities are either walled off and/or very far from school and work, as well as necessary services like groceries, pharmacies, doctors, and access to bathrooms, seating, water stations, and air conditioning. In denser areas like downtown, only paying customers are allowed to access these necessities of life.
- 24. The majority of playgrounds throughout the city have token accessibility with sidewalks, rubberized ground to access the playground, and some ground features for children and caregivers who are disabled to use; however, with the exception of Dobson Ranch, there isn't a really inclusive playground. I (and many other parents of disabled children) would love to see more inclusive playgrounds built in Mesa to allow children of all abilities to play together.
- 25. There are places in Mesa that are not easily accessible in a motorized wheelchair.
- 26. There are some business plazas that should have more accessible parking spots available, especially if they provide medical services.

- 6. Better bus routes. My son isn't eligible for Paratransit, has a part-time job, and has autism, but there is no bus service on Lindsey Rd to McKellips Rd. He works at Walmart neighborhood store, which is so frustrating. Uber/Lyft are too expensive to use every day. Our neighbor has decided

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that he does not want to help every day with rides. I, as a parent, work and cannot take and pick up my son from his job every day; this will force him to quit. It is too hot to walk home this time of the year.

- 7. Better communication with residents in communities before signing off on plans for that community. The City manager should not make decisions based solely upon single discretion or what is typical but what the neighborhood needs.
- 8. Bus stops missing the requested location numbers when I call Valley Metro for bus information.
- 9. The Center and Main crosswalk do not allow enough time. Turning drivers would love to run us over
- 10. The crosswalk at Center and Main is too quick for many disabled walkers
- 11. Employees park across from Superior Court Building on Javalina Ave., walk across the street, and then have to step up to the sidewalk to get to the building. Crosswalks are not marked well at all, and traffic is coming from the courts. I have e-mailed the county and city, but no one will take responsibility. Someone will get hurt or fall eventually."
- 12. handicap is not always close to the place you go, or you have long ramps, etc.
- 13. I have not found an accessible or inclusive park. New places being built are also not inclusive. Current areas have poorly maintained curb cuts and parking. Lighting is not near parking. Even if programs include people with disabilities, those running them seemingly are not educated on how to include them properly.
- 14. I live in the area of 8th Ave. & Dobson Rd. There are several areas where the pavement/sidewalks are uneven and cracked. I am blind, and this makes walking difficult. There should also be an accessible pedestrian signal at Dobson & 8th Ave. There are times when I have to wait through several signal cycles before safely crossing because there is no east/west traffic to alert me when it is safe to cross.
- 15. I live in the vicinity of 54th Street and Southern. Access to the bus stop eastbound is dangerous. I have to walk to Higley for a safe passage. This is problematic in the Arizona heat.
- 16. I want to be more involved in state/local politics. Having Zoom available during COVID-19 was great, but it needs to be continued. Also, broadband infrastructure needs improvement. I work from home most days, but "crashes" with Cox are frequent. Old wiring, etc. I guess.
- 17. It is very hard to find resources for people with disabilities for sports and recreation or at least support from those who have the resources to provide those resources. As well there is a lack of information and a disconnect within the community regarding resources and services working together to help people.
- 18. like me with disabling immune system problems. I'm able to go to Maricopa County Library (southeast regional branch) and Tempe Library with no problems. I have never had a problem with libraries until I entered this branch at Red Mountain.
- 19. Mold is a problem at the Red Mountain branch, and I can't go there as a result. It makes me sick! My throat closes up, and I get hives. Mesa needs this mold and water damage addressed to provide access to people.
- 20. More bus routes!! Please, thank you.
- 21. More handicapped people than before. Need more spaces
- 22. More handicapped parking at Mac is needed.
- 23. My senior apartment complex.
- 24. Need better communication regarding meeting times, locations, and topics being addressed.

Please share your experience requesting disability-related accommodations and/or accessing programs and services in the City of Mesa, if applicable.

- 1. Horrible experiences trying to use Ride Choice for medical appointments. I live in a large Senior complex that does not understand ADA.
- 2. When requesting or calling about accessible parking for a public event, like the 4th of July, I was told where to park, and when I got there, the people working directed me to accessible parking that is in the grass. Insanity.
- 3. My experience was very poor. I was ignored.
- 4. I can't access programs and services in Mesa because they are too far from my housing.
- 5. I have not, but I will look into it.
- 6. I am a disabled County employee. I park as close as I can and take a step up to the curb. The New Justice Court building has handicapped parking but is farther away. My fellow co-workers will, most of the time, walk out with me just to make sure I get to my car safely.
- 7. I don't even know what that is. What "accommodations" would anyone request?
- 8. When needing a ride from paratransit, it needs to be days in advance.
- 9. Personnel listened to and understood problems, but studies carried out in the past do not support my requests. Too expensive.
- 10. Can't find anything for the mentally challenged.
- 11. "I got in a car crash beginning January and am still recovering in a group home.
- 12. I will need a lot of help once I am discharged."
- 13. My son, whose disability is Traumatic Brain Injury, actively participates in Mesa Adaptive Sports. Some staff members would benefit from the training mentioned in #3 above, which was disappointing to me because I felt they would already be knowledgeable about those topics.

- 15. I haven't had any problems.
- 16. "I got in a car crash beginning January. still recovering in a group home.

- 18. When attending a public event, we reached out for information on accessible parking and were told where to go. Once there, nobody knew anything about it and had given all the accessible parking to those without accessible placards. When I called to follow up, I was told, "Sometimes the people we hire through the city are just not aware or told about ADA. Sorry"
- 19. As mentioned above, I have been unable to reach a person to request an APS signal at Dobson & 8th Ave. 2 years ago, I had the same issue in requesting an APS signal at Dobson & 1st St. and was never able to cross that intersection.10 years ago, I requested an APS signal at Dobson & Main, and that was installed almost immediately. It seems that the city has taken a step backward in accessibility instead of improving.

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- 20. I could not receive time-sensitive information in time to participate in the Public Meetings or votes.
- 21. I have children who are high-functioning autistic. Riding the bus/tram is difficult for them. They don't know boundaries, and when it comes to the area of Alma School and Main, they have gotten into trouble with homeless people
- 22. Darken and enlarge the computer cursor for those with sight challenges.
- 23. Mental illness
- 24. We tend to isolate ourselves behind closed doors.
- 25. The adaptive leisure programs have been amazing. My son has Autism, and last year was his first time participating in a team sport. He absolutely loved it, and his confidence soared.

- 27. The art center was accommodating for a recent performance for my family.
- 28. I am a bird watcher and find it hard in some sites to gain access with a wheelchair.

- 10. There are no barriers, apart from, as I noted above, the lack of any public announcement that the city was going to embark on a "Climate Action Plan" where residents could have challenged the

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




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- 11. Crosswalk signals at intersections are not all functioning properly. I especially rely on the audible signal to cross.
