CITY COUNCIL STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

The City of Mesa delivers innovative services and inclusive solutions for all residents, businesses and visitors through six Strategic Priorities.















FUNDING BACKGROUND

NATIONAL OPIOID SETTLEMENTS

- \$50 billion across 10 settlements
- Funds distributed over 18 years

ONE ARIZONA AGREEMENT

- Arizona share: \$1.12 billion over the next 16 years
- Maricopa County administers the County and City shares

CITY OF MESA

- Mesa share: 6.06% of Maricopa County allotment
- Mesa has received \$4.5M to date, anticipating receiving a total amount between \$17M-\$22M over the next 16 years

PREVENTION AND EDUCATION

Prevention and education play a vital role in deterring the early onset of substance use by promoting life skills and awareness about the risks associated with substance use.

- Youth education
- Public education campaigns
- Removing drugs from the street





EARLY INTERVENTION AND TREATMENT

Early intervention and treatment allows providers to identify and address substance misuse as early as possible and facilitate access to appropriate treatment options.

- Community navigators
- Pregnancy and post-partum care
- Mobile intervention, treatment, and recovery services



mesa-az COMMUNITY SERVICES

HARM REDUCTION AND RESCUE

Harm reduction is a compassionate public health approach aimed at minimizing the negative consequences of substance use.

- Naloxone distribution
- Connecting to care (examples: counseling, treatment, etc.)
- Lowering barriers to access health services (examples: providing
- transportation or childcare)



RESILIENCY AND RECOVERY



Recovery is a holistic journey toward wellness aiming to break free from the negative impacts of drug use.

- Recovery case managers
- Peer support groups
- Crisis hotlines





Applicants must meet the following minimum requirements:

- Be a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization
- Request funding of at least \$50,000
- Serve Mesa residents
- Align with at least one of the funding priorities:
 - Prevention and Education
 - Early Intervention and Treatment
 - OHarm Reduction and Rescue
 - Recovery and Resiliency



EVALUATION & SELECTION CRITERIA:

1. Alignment with funding priorities

✓ Your application must clearly demonstrate how your project aligns with one or more of these priorities.

2. Strength of the needs assessment and program design

✓ Your program design should explain exactly how your organization will address this issue, what methods you'll use, and how those methods are effective.

3. Clarity and Feasibility of the implementation plan

✓ We want to ensure your plan is achievable given the timeframe and resources available. If your proposal lacks details or seems unrealistic, it may not score as highly.



EVALUATION & SELECTION CRITERIA:

4. Organizational capacity and experience

✓ If your organization is newer or lacks extensive experience, you should highlight any expertise, partnerships, or past achievements that demonstrate your ability to succeed.

5. Partnerships and collaborative efforts

✓ Collaboration ensures that resources are used efficiently and services are not duplicated but rather complement each other.

6. Financial sustainability and budget justification

✓ Explain how you will use the funds—break down expenses into categories such as staffing, materials, services, etc.

APPLICATION PROCESS



- The Opioid Settlement Grant Committee will conduct technical reviews for application eligibility
- Agency Presentations (March 26-27)
 - Chosen applicants will receive an email notification with an invite to present their program.
 - We are not able to accommodate requested days or times from the agencies.
 - The schedule will be sent out in advance notice via email before the presentations through ZoomGrants
 - The schedule will be posted 24 hours in advance of the first meeting on our webpage.
- Settlement Grant Committee will prepare formal funding recommendations
