


THE PROBLEM

3rd Grade Literacy

- In 2023, only 40% of MPS 3rd graders passed the reading section of the AzMerit assessment.
- The pass rate was significantly lower for MPS 3rd graders from low-income households.

WHATSTORY DOES THE DATA TELL?

Key Finding #1

The majority (83%) of MPS elementary schools did not have passing rates for 3rd grade reading on the AzMerit assessment.


Key Finding #2


The following MPS elementary schools demonstrated the greatest 3rd grade literacy needs:

- Guerrero Elementary School (9% Pass Rate)
- Kerr Elementary School (14% Pass Rate)
- Redbird Elementary School (16% Pass Rate)






OUR (DATA-INFORMED) RECOMMENDATION

MPS high school students will develop "Project Book Buddy," a program in which they will read for fun with MPS K-3rd grade students.





PROJECT BOOK BUDDY

Overview

- MPS high school students will visit elementary students during "free periods."
 - Start with Guerrero, Kerr, and Redbird.
 - Use existing benchmark data to identify neediest students.
 - Incentivize high school students with service hours/resume building.







POTENTIAL OUTCOMES

Reading for fun helps elementary students (especially English Language Learners) increase cognitive function, vocabulary, and writing skills.

Reading for fun with mentors helps elementary students reduce chronic absenteeism, anxiety, depression, and other behavioral challenges.

Improving third grade literacy rates in MPS will help meet the demand for high-skill, high-wage jobs at companies like Google and Boeing in Mesa.


